Medical Detection Dogs

(April monthly meeting)

On this lovely spring morning, a lively full house waited expectantly for what proved to be a fascinating presentation by Wendy Coley. Wendy is an enthusiastic fund raiser for Medical Detection Dogs, a little-known charity which has gained the patronage of the Duchess of Cornwall. Wendy explained to us the aims of the charity. The basis of its work is training dogs to use their extraordinary sense of smell to detect changes in an individual's personal aroma triggered by diseases and so to help to save lives. There are two strands to the work of the charity.

Bio Detection Dogs

Like a lot of good ideas, this one started with anecdotal evidence. Stories came back to Dr. Claire Guest, the founder, from people who had been alerted to their own illnesses by the behaviour of their dogs and she decided to investigate further. She carried her own trials with dogs on urine samples provided by her local hospital from patients with bladder cancer. She then moved on to renal and prostate cancers and had remarkable success with her trained dogs. Two years later the charity was formed but the medical profession was not interested until 2014 when the Duchess of Cornwall became the Patron and in turn secured the involvement of Prince Charles.



Medical Alert Assistance Dogs

Type 1 diabetes was next on the agenda. Trained dogs were able to detect blood sugar level changes before the patients showed obvious symptoms. This work has proved very successful and saved many patients from long and expensive stays in hospital to regulate their sugar levels. The research has led to investigation into management of other chronic diseases.

The short-term aim of the charity is to help save lives but in the long term it is hoped that the research into the workings of the canine sense of smell will lead to the development of electronic equipment and software for instant screening at your GP surgery. Thank you, Wendy, for a very interesting presentation.
