Life on the Canals

(November monthly meeting)



A modest and unassuming lady garbed in the traditional attire of a dweller on a working narrowboat stood before us with a fascinating array of the possessions needed for life in cramped quarters. Mary Matts held her audience spellbound for the next hour as she shared her astonishing knowledge of life on the canals. She began with a reprise of their development. Propelled by the industrial revolution the canals became the motorways of their day. The success of the Bridgewater Canal led eventually to the creation of a network of more than 4,000 miles of waterways linking the ports of Liverpool, Hull, Bristol and London and many other places. The canals carried heavy goods (building materials, coal and such), food, beer, animals and manufactured products, and eventually passengers, faster, more safely and more reliably than was possible by road. Then of course came competition from the railways and from an improving network of roads.

The boats that plied the canals were mostly built to standard dimensions – 70 feet long by 7 feet wide (half the width of a coastal barge) – in order to be able to pass through the locks, bridges and tunnels of the canal system. These were the narrow boats. The canal owners levied tolls on cargoes as a means of raising revenue. As competition from the railways intensified, the canal

owners were forced to cut their tolls. As the tolls fell so did the wages of the men employed on the canals.

Canals were constructed by the 'navvies', many of them former farm labourers attracted by higher wages. As the canals were completed many of these men in turn became operators of the narrow boats. Most canal journeys were initially quite short. The boatmen would have cottages near the canal bank to which they would return at night to their families. But as wages fell families were progressively forced to make their homes on the narrowboats.

This was the backdrop to a wonderful account of working and family life on the canals that ranged from their industrial heyday to the present time. We learned about compact utensils, the treatment of horses, food and foraging, the expression of pride in the home through cleanliness, order and décor, best dress and workaday clothes, roses and castles and much else besides. Of course after slow decline it nearly all came to a dead end in the 1960s, but, as we learned, mercifully there has been a rebirth driven by tourism, and conservation and even the construction of new canals continues apace today. A truly enlightening talk drawn from a deep well of personal knowledge and experience, a real delight!

English Country Dancing

Wassail!

The group will meet for the last time before the Christmas/New Year break on Tuesday December 13 when, sustained by mince pies, we shall try some traditional seasonal dances including *In the Fields in Frost and Snow*, *Drive the Cold Winter Away* and *The Punchbowl*. Also we shall use the tunes of popular carols and Christmas music to dance some modern compositions – *Christmas Crackers*, *Mistletoe Kisses* and even *Jingle Bells*! As we go through the festive season there are several opportunities for members to attend Christmas and New Year party dances at local folk dance clubs; full details are available from Peter, the Group Leader. The group will resume its regular weekly dancing on Tuesday January 10th.

We are always pleased to welcome new members who would like to try this fun activity. Most of our dances are conducted at walking pace, with occasionally skipping so are not too vigorous. The dances are performed in specific formations of circles, squares and longways sets, and they span English Country, English Court (Playford), and American Square and Contra styles. Some dances

date back to the Stuart and Georgian/Regency periods, or even earlier, while others were written very recently. The music we use ranges from classical (Handel, Purcell, Mozart, Bach, Strauss all wrote dance tunes!) to modern compositions, sometimes even jazz; for the older country dances many of the tunes will be familiar to anybody who enjoys traditional English folk music. No previous experience is needed as all the dances are fully explained, the moves are walked through before setting them to music and the dances are called throughout. Also, no special clothing needed - just light-weight shoes or sandals and comfortable clothing suitable for gentle dancing. Nor do you need to come with a partner; singles of both sexes are welcomed, and we often change partners during the dances so that everybody is involved. The only requirement is to be prepared to join in, and enjoy yourself.
