Annual Group Leaders' Meeting



Group Leaders had their annual informal meeting with Committee members on 22 April 2016 at the Methodist Hall. The topics discussed were finance and funding, the website, support for disabled members and matters raised by Group Leaders.

Group Leaders were advised that we are running at a small deficit. To reduce the shortfall some changes to the funding of groups are required. Funding for equipment will continue but funds for consumables should be met by each group. (So, for example, U3A Great Glen would pay for a table for the Table Tennis Group but not the balls.) Most groups have worked on this basis for a long time. However a few groups have received other support, which will cease later this year. The Group Leaders concerned will discuss this with members and, if extra money is needed, work out how best to collect it.

The Committee considers that the current level of £1 per session for voluntary donations should remain unchanged for now. However groups are permitted to set a higher level, for instance where they need to pay for additional resources or speakers. (Garden Visits already operate this scheme.) The extra contribution must not however discourage attendance. Contributions should, in the interests of simplicity, be set at a level that remains constant for a reasonable period – say at least three months for a group meeting every week. (The contribution for Swimming should cover the group's costs, and will need to be set in the light of costs and attendances over several years. When the annual increased lifeguard charge starts in September a higher sessional contribution may be necessary.)

In the light of prompting from articles in the last two editions of *Third Age Matters*, Group Leaders have been asked to discuss with any members with a disability what support they would like to seek, to enable them to continue their enjoyment of the group. Do make your needs known and suggest what would help you. We are also interested in the needs of those who have stopped attending a group because of a disability. The Committee may not be able to solve every difficulty but we should like the opportunity to see what might be done.

Topics raised by the Group Leaders were considered by the Committee at its meeting on 2nd May. Some of these need further consideration. However the Committee has confirmed that the provision of milk (and biscuits, where applicable) is a matter for Group Leaders to sort out with their groups. The Committee also concluded that under current arrangements it is not possible to make receiving (and subscribing the very modest annual amount for) *Third Age Matters* optional without creating significant extra administrative work. The Committee also believes that the magazine should help members to have a better understanding of U3A and all that it offers.

Living Memories of Characters in Belgrave Cemetery

April Monthly Meeting



A chilly, grey spring morning and the grave title of the month's talk – see above – just what awaited us? Enter a tall figure swathed from head to toe in unrelieved black, save for a jaunty pink flower nodding on her bonnet. Gliding purposefully in from the back to the sound of a handbell and a rousing hymn came Sandra Moore, our speaker, in the guise of Elizabeth Goodwin, deceased, former Head Teacher of Belgrave Elementary School. Miss Goodwin had died in harness aged fifty-three in the early nineteen twenties. She was the very embodiment – perhaps not quite the right word here – of a spinster schoolmistress, complete with cane and a sharp tongue.

Miss Goodwin, assisted by Nicholas, her assistant 'apprentice' (they are both members of the Friends of Belgrave Cemetery) presented us with thumbnail sketches of various personalities and their families interred in the cemetery. A pretty mixed bunch they were: Hannah Croft, who campaigned against the demon drink; Roland Grimstone, a former Chief Constable of the County of Leicestershire; Edwin Carr, a chemist who manufactured Carr's Fever Products and left a fortune (but not the formula for his highly profitable patent medicines); Barry Young, who danced with feathers; and Joseph Cave who, while overseeing the digging of his own grave, sang 'Poor Old Joe'. We were invited to sing along and did so with spirit. Then there was Ann Garner who worked until she was one hundred as housekeeper to Lord Mayors and departed this life four years later.

This ghostly gallery was accompanied by some fine views of the cemetery as it is today and by sepia photographs of times past. The most striking of these were of lavish funerals, particularly that of Sally Elliot, whose many 'over the top' floral tributes included a packet of cigarettes. Belgrave Cemetery, one of Leicester's four municipal cemeteries, is tucked away by the Redhill roundabout. It provided us with the topic for an interesting, if unusual, performed talk, and looked certainly sufficiently interesting to warrant a visit.

English Country Dancing

"Spring has Sprung", and 1st May has come and gone! Local folk dance clubs have recently been celebrating "St George's Day", the "90th birthday of HM the Queen" and "May Day" – so why aren't YOU joining in the fun?

The English Country Dancing Group continues to meet every week on Tuesday afternoons from 2.00 to 4.00 p.m. in the Sports Hall. Most of our dances are performed at walking pace, with occasional skipping, so are not too vigorous. The music we use ranges from Handel, Purcell, Mozart, Bach, etc, to modern compositions, sometimes even jazz, and often features tunes that will be very familiar to all those who enjoy traditional English folk music. The dances are performed in specific formations of circles, squares and longways sets, and they span English Country, English Court (Playford), American Squares and Contra styles; some date back to the Stuart and Georgian/Regency periods while others were written very recently.

No previous experience is needed as all the dances are fully explained and walked through before setting them to music, and then called throughout. You do not need to come with a partner; singles of both sexes are welcomed. Just wear light-weight shoes and comfortable clothing suitable for gentle dancing and, most importantly, be prepared to laugh a lot!

The group will continue dancing through May and June but will probably not meet during the summer for part of July and August. Further details will be announced in the June Newsletter. Come and join us for an afternoon of fun and gentle exercise in good company!

News from the Film Group

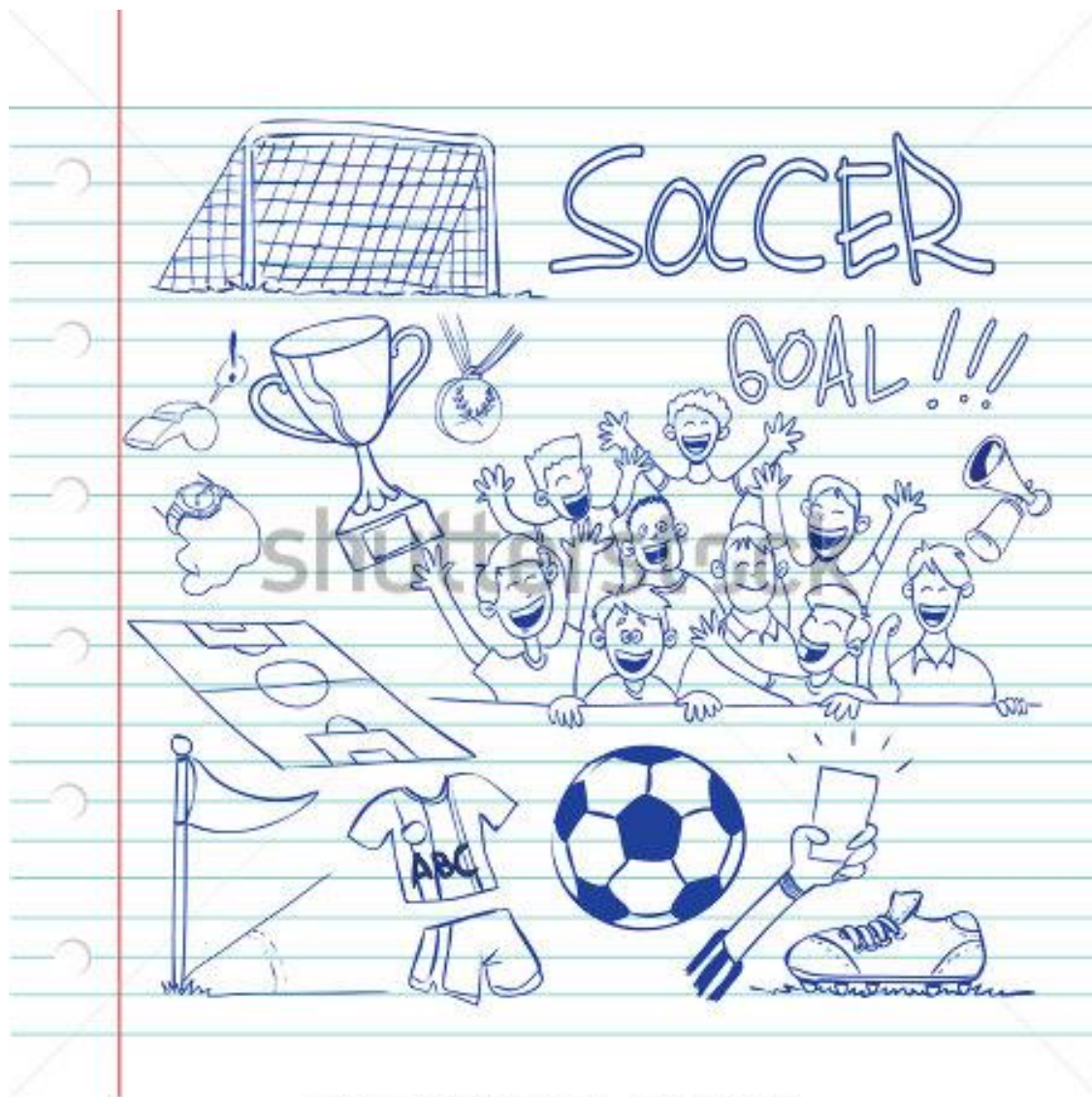
