English Country Dancing

Since the group resumed its dancing in September we have tried over 40 different dances, ranging in dates from the 16th to the 21st centuries! At the end of October we celebrated Halloween with an afternoon of suitably titled dances - *Black (Yellow) Cat Jig, Pumpkin Pie, The Geud Man O' Ballangigh, The Witches Reel, Devil's Dream, and The Devil Amongst the Tailors*; the last, as reported in Thomas Hardy's passage "Absent mindedness in the choir!

At the beginning of November, following the History Group's meeting "In the footsteps of Jane Austen" we shall hold an afternoon of dances that were popular during Jane Austen's lifetime and that she may have danced herself - so, literally "in the steps of Jane Austen"! These will include a selection of country dances - *The Comical Fellow, The Hop Pickers' Feast, Wakefield Hunt, Mr Beveridge's Maggott and Shrewsbury Lasses*. Although it is clear from her books and her letters to her sister Cassandra that Jane Austen very much enjoyed dancing, she actually only names one dance, *La Boulangerie*, in her writings; if the group have sufficient energy, we shall try that too! During October we had a maximum ever attendance of 21, which was great fun - and we still can accommodate a few more if anybody else would like to join us. Twenty-four regular dancers would be an ideal number allowing us to do 3- and 4-couple dances as well as Circles, Squares and Longways sets, with nobody left out! Why not come and join us on Tuesday afternoons for a session of good fun that gently exercises both body and mind, and gives a lift to well-being? We guarantee you will make new friends, laugh a lot and leave with a smile on your face. There is a whole world of enjoyment out there.

Dear friends

On behalf of the Methodist Church, I wish to thank your Chairman, Peter, for his kind comments in the October Newsletter about the refurbishment of our historic listed chapel and to thank you all for your patience during the summer months when the car park was not available. The result of our efforts has been widely admired.

If you have not yet had the opportunity to see what has been done, please do have a look when you are next on the premises.

This achievement has only proved possible through the sacrificial giving of our own

congregation (many of whom are on limited incomes) to the tune of £25,000. I'm sure you will agree that this is a magnificent effort for a small congregation. An equally munificent bequest from one of our members, the late Sybil Tomlin, and generous grants from the wider Methodist Church and various other charitable bodies have meant that all this has been achieved without our having to ask for any support from bodies who use the premises, such as U3A, even for fundraising events.

We hope that the chapel might now provide an attractive venue for appropriate U3A activities, continuing our long, happy and mutually beneficial relationship.
