### **The Last Naval Hero - Speaker Roy Smart** *(September monthly meeting)*

We learned in a most interesting talk from Roy Smart that David Richard Beatty was born in 1871 and grew

up to be a naval hero in the Nelson tradition. He has been variously described as ‘a daring sea dog in the Drake tradition, and a lion of a man – with his bulldog air and cap at a rakish angle’. Trained at the Royal Naval College Dartmouth he very quickly rose through the ranks being promoted commander at 27 and captain at 29. Despite having completed only 3 years at sea he found himself promoted to admiral at 39 years of age. Our navy at the time was seen as the greatest in the world, and as war between Britain and Germany became inevitable Beatty was put in charge of a battle cruiser squadron by the First Lord of the Admiralty Winston Churchill. Based in Scotland under Commander-in-Chief Admiral Jellicoe, Beatty used his ships against the German navy at the Battle of Jutland. Three of his cruisers went down with over 3,000 lives lost and another 11 ships in total were also sunk. The German navy lost 11 ships in total but during the night they sailed back into German harbours where they remained for the rest of the war thus leaving the Royal Navy with the upper hand at sea. By 1916 Beatty was Admiral of the Fleet and following the Armistice he escorted the German fleet to Scapa Flow. He also led the naval contingent in the Peace March through London following the war. Beatty’s married life was fraught with controversy: he secretly married the mega-rich divorcee Ethel Tree but she was neurotic and promiscuous, and Beatty found

consolation with another married lady, Eugenie Godfrey-Fausett.

Following the war Beatty was heaped with honours and at his death given a state funeral at St Paul's Cathedral where he lies next to Admiral Jellicoe and near to Admiral Lord Nelson in the crypt.

Beatty and Ethel's many mansions included Brooksby Hall, Kelmarsh Hall and Dingley Hall where Ethel is buried. At Dingley there is a bust of him in the church together with a memorial to those who died at Jutland. The fountains in Trafalgar Square are named after him and Jellicoe, and watched over by their busts, under the stern eye of Lord Nelson on his column above.

## **English Country Dancing**

We have been very pleased to welcome several new members to the group in recent weeks. This week, on 4<sup>th</sup> October, we had 18 people dancing so were able to progress from short sets to "large circles" and "longways, for as many as will" dances.

Amongst the ones we tried was the ever popular Contra-dance "Devil's Dream" to the traditional tune "Up Jumped the Devil". Its driving music perfectly fits the marching up and down the hall and the changes of direction via "half turns", "full ladies-chains" and "promenades"; we still need to improve our knowledge of "right, left, forward and back" and the ensuing errors caused great merriment but we shall persist and we will master it – all good fun!

We still have space for a few more members, so if anybody else would like to try this fun activity please do get in touch. As demonstrated at the Open Day, most of our dances are conducted at walking pace with occasional skipping, so are not too vigorous. The

dances are performed in specific formations of circles, squares and longways sets, and they span English Country, English Court (Playford), and American Square and Contra styles. Some dances date back to the Stuart and Georgian/Regency periods, or even earlier, while others were written very recently. The music we use ranges from classical (Handel, Purcell, Mozart, Bach, Strauss all wrote dance tunes!) to modern compositions, sometimes even jazz; for the older country dances many of the tunes will be very familiar to anybody who enjoys traditional English folk music.

No previous experience is needed as all the dances are fully explained, the moves are walked through before setting them to music and the dances are called throughout. Also, no special clothing needed – just light-weight shoes or sandals and comfortable clothing suitable for gentle dancing. Nor do you need to come with a partner; singles of both sexes are welcomed, and we often change partners during the dances so that everybody is involved. The only requirement is to be prepared to join in, and enjoy yourself. Come and join us!
