Anthony Nolan Trust – Hollies Legacy

(August monthly meeting)



Thanks in no small measure to Peter Russell and Toni Smith for successfully resolving technical glitches with the speaker's equipment, the meeting started pretty well on time! Our speaker was Kathy Carter, a local lass from Oadby. What on earth was she wearing though? It turned out that the pink frilly knickers on her head were part of the trade mark of Hollies Legacy, a continuing drive by family members and a growing band of supporters to raise funds and recruit volunteers for the Anthony Nolan Trust. Hollie Clark, Kathy's grand-daughter, had been diagnosed with a rare bone marrow disorder at the age of eight in 2014. Hollie had a stem cell transplant arranged through the agency of the Anthony Nolan Trust, but very sadly later suffered fatal complications. Anthony Nolan died in infancy in 1979 needing a bone marrow transplant, for which a suitable donor could not be found. His death led to the foundation of a trust that now operates worldwide, matching donors with patients in need of stem cell and bone marrow transplants. Hollies Legacy has since its inception raised over £135K through the tireless efforts of people like Kathy. Already recognised as one of Leicester's heroes, we took her to our hearts. Though the audience was over age for donating tissue, we were urged to visit the Anthony Nolan website and to spread the word. Liz Adams told us about how she had, when younger, been shortlisted as a donor for someone in the USA, and had had a blood sample sent by express delivery – though in the event a closer match was found. The procedure had seemed straightforward and very professionally executed.

English Country Dancing

It's time to brush up your "Do-si-Dos", and "Set and Turn Singles"!

After a break during July and August the English Country Dancing Group resumed its regular Tuesday afternoon meetings, 1.30 to 3.30 p.m., in the Youth Centre/Sports Hall on 5th September. We still have space for more people so we warmly invite any other members of the U3A who would like to try this fun and social activity to come along.

Country Dancing offers an afternoon of gentle exercise in good company. Most of our dances are conducted at walking pace, with occasional skipping so are not too vigorous. The dances are performed in specific formations of circles, squares and longways sets, and they span English Country, English Court (Playford), and American Square and Contra styles. Some dances date back to the Stuart and Georgian/Regency periods, or even earlier, whilst others were written very recently. The music we use ranges from classical (Handel, Purcell, Mozart, Bach, Strauss all wrote super dance tunes) to modern compositions, sometimes even jazz and swing; for the older country dances many tunes will be recognisable to anybody who enjoys traditional English folk music. No previous experience is needed as all the dances are fully explained, the moves are walked through before setting them to music and the dances are called throughout. Also, no special clothing is needed - just light-weight shoes or sandals and comfortable clothing suitable for gentle dancing. Nor do you need to come with a partner: singles of both sexes are welcomed, and we often change partners during the dances so that everybody is involved. The only requirement is to be prepared to join in and enjoy yourself!

The start of the new dancing year sees a number of Barn Dances and Costume "Playford" Balls at various Folk Dance clubs in the near region, at which members of the group will be very welcome. If we can get copies of the dancing programmes the group will practise some of the dances in case anybody does decide to attend.

Garden Visits

ALZHEIMER'S SOCIETY'S MEMORY WALK

Memory Walk is Alzheimer's Society's biggest fundraising event, involving a series of sponsored walks which take place in autumn, across England, Wales and Northern Ireland. The event supports some of Alzheimer's Society's vital work, including essential research, and life-changing local services for thousands of families affected by dementia. In 2016, walkers raised over £6.6m – that's enough to fund 76 PhD students for three years to conduct innovative research to ultimately search for a cure.

In Autumn 2017, walks return to over 30 locations, including the Leicester Memory Walk in Abbey Park on Sunday 1st October. Memory Walk is open to all ages and abilities, and four-legged friends too. Families and friends are encouraged to come together, united against dementia to raise funds. Essential to the success of the walks are our fantastic volunteers – without volunteers, we can't raise the money needed to beat dementia.

Roles for volunteers are varied: helping us from everything to setting up stalls in the morning, to marshalling the route and helping to take banners down at the end of the day. Volunteers also support with fundraising and handing out medals to the finishing walkers.
